

"The danger we all face as we prepare for the future is the tendency to be indifferent to the presence of God in our plans. We participate in that humanistic spirit prevalent in our Western world, a spirit that often expresses itself in the way we plan for the future. When we think we can do things on our own, we act as though we have little or no need of God. Then we become self-confident, begin to believe in ourselves, and think ourselves to be invincible. When this happens God becomes remote and even absent from our lives.

We may go for days without concern to hear God speak to us through his Word. At the same time the religious practices in which we engage – prayer before meals and attendance at Sunday worship – take on a ritualistic and somewhat meaningless character. We do them as one might run a machine in a mindless job, and they mean little to us. They have no power, and God does not reach us through them. They have become dead forms, lifeless and without meaning. To say we did not mean for this to happen would be an understatement. None of us wants God to become remote and removed from our lives. Nevertheless God sometimes becomes distant

Perhaps we cannot trace back to the point at which we became spiritually indifferent. But we know the aliveness to God we once had has dissipated and is now lost in our personal experience. Perhaps we have not chosen to let God be in our lives. We live quite comfortably with God at a distance. In times like these our personal experience is akin to Israel's before the birth of Christ. It is also similar to the condition of the world today, a world that is still largely indifferent to its Creator, the one who alone can give it meaning and purpose.

Our lives as well as those of Israel, the church, and the world pass through rhythms of cold indifference, and then God breaks into our lives and we become open and receptive. In the twists and turns of these alterations we are called to a new awareness of life, to new commitments, to a new conversion of the soul. Whenever this happens an Advent has occurred, for Advent is the time when God breaks in on us with new surprises and touches us with a renewing and restoring power."







